

Dependent Clauses

■ Choose the dependent clause in the sentence and tell us whether it is a time clause or conditional clause. For example:

Question: After I have eaten my dinner, I will go out with my friends.

Answer: After I have eaten my dinner - Time Clause

- Q1. If John has time, he will go to the beach.
- **Q2.** Stephanie will cook dinner for herself, unless someone invites her out to a restaurant.
- Q3. When an earthquake occurs, many buildings are destroyed.
- **Q4.** Since I was a boy, I have spoken English as my first language.
- **Q5.** Shane always does his homework before he goes out with his friends.
- **Q6.** If Daphne solves the crime, she will be very happy.
- **Q7.** You are allowed into a country except if you don't have a passport.
- **Q8.** The meeting starts at 7 o'clock.
- Q9. If Stephen doesn't have enough money, how can he pay for the things he needs?
- Q10. Shaggy likes to play with his dog when he gets home.

- A4. Since I was a boy Time clause
- A5. Before he goes out with his friends Time clause
- A6. If Daphne solves the crime Conditional clause
- A7. Except if you don't have a passport Conditional clause
- A8. At 7 o'clock Time clause
- A9. If Stephen doesn't have enough money Conditional clause
- A10. When he gets home Time clause
